Being on the scene of a horrific car accident takes a toll. My point? Simple -- do not take for granted the men and women who work around the clock to help us when we are at our lowest. This includes, but is not limited to fire, police, EMS, nurses and doctors.

Do not scream, yell or curse when you are inconvenienced by emergency vehicles. Pull over to the side of the road to let them by. Your meeting can wait five minutes, their heroic efforts cannot.

Let's hope all of those people who were hurt on our highways in the past two weeks come out of this living to tell the tale. For the rest of us, stay safe and drive cautiously.
